I suppose nobody really likes change—unless we thought it up first!

But. Thinking theologically about this—which is just another way to say, "Where is God in all this?"—reminds me that God is always surprising us.

If you look at scripture, God's people are constantly having to adjust to something they hadn't expected. Granted, not everything was from the hand of God.... But there are too many stories to ignore. Noah building a big boat with no water in sight. Elijah asking a starving widow to feed him first, before herself and her little boy. Elisha insisting that the great foreign general bathe in the paltry, muddy Jordan River to be cured of his leprosy. The most obvious might well be Jesus himself, born to show human beings the image of God. He never was predictable—always healing the wrong people, eating with the wrong people, getting mad at the good, orderly religious people (hmmm. Could that be us?)...

Most surprising of all, Jesus showed a way of humility, of laying aside all his power and privilege, of being a servant, of paying attention to forgotten people, and finally, suffering and dying. All of that must have been shocking to the people who liked things to be under control and regulated.

Does any of that fit with our simple little schedule change? Let's just say that, any time we start to get comfortable in the church, something is going to change, and our task is to look for God in it.

Memories Shared by a Long-Time Member— Irline (Spratt) Capehart

Ask, and You Will Receive (all you detectives out there—you know how long ago this was; let us know if you know who helped write it, and if you've seen it in this newsletter before!)

Irline woke up early that morning, too excited to sleep; today was the day she was going home from the Hospital! She thought of her friends at the nursing home where she worked as a volunteer; they had sent cards and get-well wishes, anxious to see her again. Irline's own mother was there in that home, her small withered body hardly visible under the sheets, yet her eyes full of the joy of the Lord. Irline yawned and stretched; a sharp twinge reminded her of her surgery a week before. She felt quite strong and alert, able to "lick her weight in wildcats," but after she washed and dressed, weakness flooded her body.

The doctor was definite: "Now remember, Mrs. Spratt, no lifting, no pushing, no straining. And no driving your car for at least two weeks. If you want to visit at the nursing home, just visit. You aren't ready to push wheelchairs yet."

Irline's volunteer work at the home had almost saved her life. Four years before, her husband had passed away, and five months after that, her beautiful little granddaughter had died in the wreckage of an automobile accident after her high school prom. The two tragic events had almost been too much. For nearly a year, Irline felt weak and helpless. Then, through her visits to her mother at the nursing home, more and more opportunities to serve opened up; God gave her work to do, and strength to do it, with a real talent for working with the elderly. They loved and accepted her; she returned their love, and she soon felt young and useful again.

Now, after this surgery, she had to slow down, but she had the doctor's assurance that she would soon feel good as new, <u>if</u> she followed his orders, and <u>if</u> she refrained from lifting or straining. Not driving her car for several weeks would be difficult but she supposed she had better heed his orders.

The nurses came to get Irline ready for dismissal. She assured them she could walk down to the exit wait for her son Tom to come, but she was mighty grateful for the wheelchair by the time she was ready to go outside. As she stepped up into the pickup, her

knees turned to rubber. The nurse grabbed her. Her purse fell on the pavement and opened. After getting Irline safely settled, the nurse picked up the purse and its contents which had spilled on the hospital driveway, and handed it to Irline before she and Tom drove off.

The days went by slowly. She stayed with Tom and Judy for a few days, her strength returning bit by bit. She managed to walk to the bank and the grocery store, and her friends and her children gave her other rides when necessary, but how she missed driving her car!

Finally, the two weeks were over. There stood the little Chevy, waiting for her. She talked to her cousin and told him, "At last I can drive again; my two weeks are up, and I can hardly wait." "Oh, Irline," he said, "I don't think you ought to drive yet. Maybe if you wait a few more days, you'll feel stronger and more able to handle it."

But she was eager to try. She reached into her purse. No keys. "Oh, I must have left them at Tom and Judy's house. And they're out of town for a few days. I guess I'll have to wait until they get home next Saturday."

Saturday she called, "Judy, did you find my car keys at your house? No? Will you look under that bed I slept in?" Judy hunted high and low; no keys.

Irline was beginning to panic. She searched her own apartment, every possible place, and some places impossible. Next time she went to Judy's house, she took a good look for herself. Still no keys. Back at her own place, she sat down on a chair. "Lord Jesus, help me find my keys. I can't do it alone," she sobbed. "I just pray, dear Lord.... You said, 'Ask, and you will receive....' Please help me, Lord."

Like a flash, she suddenly thought of that day of dismissal from the hospital—the opened purse—the contents on the pavement. "Oh no! If I dropped them on the hospital driveway, I'll never get them back—Oh, dear Lord!"

So she called Lutheran Hospital. "Yes, the security guard found some keys several weeks ago, and locked them up for safekeeping. You say, a little brown leather case with stitching? Yes, there's one like that here."

God's eye is on the sparrow, and also on a small brown keycase. Irline had waited with her driving one more week. Now she was stronger. Now the Lord let her have her keys. And she could drive her car! —Reprinted with Irline's permission.

Week of Compassion Supports Small Farmers and Sustainable Development the World Over

The Week of Compassion Advisory Committee met for their annual spring meeting from May 22-24. The Committee had the privilege of gathering in West Bridgewater, Massachusetts, at the site of our partner organization, Equal Exchange. For the past five years, Week of Compassion and Disciples Home Mission have together partnered with Equal Exchange Co-Op to help support fair trade efforts with small stakeholder farmers around the world. For decades, as stated in our Purpose and Priorities Guidelines, one of WoC's priorities has been to "directly benefit small-scale farmers and the urban poor." Through our Disciples Coffee Project, Disciples purchasing coffee or other fairly traded products through Equal Exchange (such as tea, chocolate, almonds, etc.) have been able to support small farmers directly, have enjoyed delicious and robust coffee, and have supported Week of Compassion's Food Security Fund. With every pound of coffee Disciples of Christ purchase, 15 cents comes right back to WoC's Food Security Fund so that we can support more agricultural assistance projects. The Committee was able to meet with the Equal Exchange staff, tour the facilities (including the amazing coffee roasters!), and experience an authentic "cupping" (a coffee tasting) in the Quality Control Lab. In addition to deepening their knowledge of fair trade and WoC's support of small farmers, the Committee also reviewed many proposals for **sustainable development projects** around the globe. The annual budget for Sustainable Development projects for the 2012 fiscal year is \$305,000.

The Committee approved a total of \$157,000 in projects at their May meeting. We were pleased to approve the following development programs through GlobalMinistries, Church World Service, and IMA World Health:

Tanzania - Cervical Cancer Prevention and Control - \$10,000

Tanzania - Combating Burkitt's Lymphoma in Children - \$20,000

South Africa - Ons Plek Girls Shelter - \$6.000

Kenya - Biamiti School Improvement Project - \$10,000

Republic of Georgia - Empowering Youth at the Tbilisi Youth House Foundation - \$18,000

Chaco Region, South America - Food Security for Indigenous Weenhayek Communities - \$18,000

Paraguay - Teko Joja Ha Pora Project (Community Development and Human Rights)- \$20,000

Israel/Palestine - Interfaith Program for Educators and Principals - \$5,000

Philippines - Organic Farming and Poultry Project - \$10,000

Afghanistan - Orthopedic Workshop and Physical Therapy Center - \$20,000

Sri Lanka - Strengthening Interfaith Relations - \$10,000

India - Emmanuel Boys Hostel - \$10,000

Week of Compassion understands sustainable development as Church World Service defines it, which is to "promote durable institutions of civil society that empower communities to ultimately become self-reliant and free from dependence on external aid." In addition to the extensive responses WoC makes to relief and emergency situations as they arise, we are equally called to respond to requests for self-help and to promote the development of people victimized by economic, sociological, educational, or spiritual privation. We also aim to fund programs which get to the heart of the root causes of poverty, hunger and injustice.

We thank you for your ongoing support which allows us to continue to channel resources to communities that offer people the opportunity to be empowered and involved in their own development.

Compassionate Caring

Blejandra has a dream. Every day she seeks to make a difference in someone's life even if it is in a small way. The dream began when Alejandra was a toddler and bumped into a kerosene stove while playing. Within a few seconds she had suffered burns on most of her abdomen, keg and arm. She spent many days throughout her early childhood in the hospital recovering from multiple operations. At a very young age, Alejandra decided she would find a way to help other people.

On the morning after the February 2010 earthquake and tsunami in Chile, Alejandra, now a nurse and first aid facilitator at the Shalom Center, went to Dichato, a fishing and tourist village where her father pastors a church, Climbing over mounds of debris, carefully avoiding pits of water left by the five immense waves that flowed one after the other over Dichato, she found the little mission church still standing among the piles of cars, washing machines, beds and refrigerators. None of the homes of the members of the church remained.

Later that day, Alejandra was finally able to find the sisters and brothers of the church. They were up in the hills preparing to camp, not only homeless but fearful of the constant earth tremors. Alejandra went right to work. First she organized the church to provide aid in the immediate needs of dry clothing, food, clean drinking water, first aid, and shelter. Then, Alejandra began to think about how to care for the emotional trauma of not only of those from Dichato but also in the other towns and villages in the area. Alejandra had been certified in trauma healing and resilience just a few weeks before the earthquake, but she wanted to find a way to connect her medical training as a nurse to the spiritual and emotional wounds of the people around her.

Thanks to a scholarship provided by the Shalom Center and the Brookfield Institute, Alejandra was able to travel to Massachusetts for two weeks of specialized training in massage and trauma healing. She returned to Tomé and Dichato and is ministering to many children, youth and adults that continue to suffer the long term effects of the disaster. Alejandra is fulfilling her dream. She is making a difference.

We pray that our dreams of making a difference can be made our life's reality and that our example, like Alejandra's will let others know of our faith in our God of love.
