Pastoral Thoughts— The Blessings of the Wider Church

I heard an interesting comment from a new friend I met at Quadrennial Assembly. She said, "I wouldn't even be involved in the church if I didn't know that we're doing so much at the larger level." I think she meant that there's often little we can do on our own, but when we get together with so many other Christians, and so many other churches as a denomination, we can do so much good not only around the country, but around the world.

That's one of the main reasons for national gatherings such as Quadrennial and General Assembly—so that we can be encouraged by what's going on among our brothers and sisters in other places, and so we can be energized in our own ministries.

At my first Quadrennial Assembly ever, Dr. Sharyn Dowd was the Bible study teacher. That means she gave a 25-minute lesson to the entire assembly every morning but Sunday. Many of you may remember that Dr. Dowd is one of my mentors, and that she preached at my installation service here at ECC four years ago.

I returned from Quadrennial with DVDs of Dr. Dowd's Bible study lectures, and the ECC Bible Study group was able to watch and then discuss the first one recently.

Just another of the riches of the larger church, for which we can give thanks to God.

A North Carolina Disciple is among a group of former Negro League baseball players, who helped celebrate the issuance of a commemorative United States postal stamp, which honors the league. Carl Long, who played with the Black Barons of Birmingham, Ala., was recognized with the dedication of a new stamp on July 2 in Washington, N.C., along with several other former athletes from the Negro League. Long is a member of Grove Park Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), in Kinston.

Long is the father of Sotello V. Long, regional minister of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) in South Carolina. Sotello Long and his wife, Dee, congregational services consultant for Church Extension, were involved in the unveiling of the new stamp. In addition, "Carl Long's Day" was observed in Kinston on July 3 during the Kinston Indians baseball game.

Pastoral Letter from DOC Leadership

To Churches Affected by the Gulf Oil Spill

Hear my prayer, O Lord;
Iet my cry come to you.
Do not hide your face from me
In the day of my distress.

Our Dear Friends and Partners in Ministry:

We write to you with hearts heavy with grief. Like most of the world, we have watched as the disastrous oil spill in the Gulf Coast has continued, seemingly unabated. We have watched as those we have entrusted to prevent such tragedies have puzzled over how this could have happened, and we have watched as attempt after attempt to stop the leak has failed.

We are angry, hurt, and disappointed. We are also well aware that your proximity to this disaster sharpens your emotions. Beaches marked by oil, wildlife sticky with oil, struggling economies—these are happening not just on your televisions, but also in your communities, perhaps even in your backyards. We grieve with you, pray for you, and have hope for an end to the damage done by this spill and for the healing of the Gulf Coast.

We know, too, that the damage done by hurricanes in the recent past makes your hurt all the more palpable. We weep with you as we remember the recovery work that still needs to happen across the Gulf Coast from Texas to Florida, and we pray with you as we anticipate the current hurricane season.

Above all, we share with you a commitment to ministry in the midst of such uncertainty. Though our hearts are heavy with grief, they are full of faith as well. From the office of the General Minister and President to the seminary classrooms, God's call to respond continues to resonate.

Those of us who serve as Regional and Area Ministers along the Gulf Coast are here to listen and to respond to pastoral needs as best we can, and we are committed to connecting you with the services you need.

Those of us at Week of Compassion stand ready to collaborate with our Regions and congregations to help provide relief to those affected by the spill—whether that means collaborating on recovery efforts with our ecumenical partners or providing resources to our congregations and church

members for whom the economic fallout from this disaster is proving to be a disaster in itself.

Please let us know how we can be of assistance. All of us make up the Church—the very Body of Christ, and as we know from that oft-repeated letter of Paul, whenever one member suffers, the rest of us suffer as well.

We send to you our tender love, our fledgling hope, and prayers that the one who calls us to be signs of grace in a harsh but holy world might continue to push us toward wholeness and healing.

Tenacious Hope

Every Wednesday at noon, Mrs. E is there. She sits in front of the Japanese embassy in Seoul, Korea with her friends to ask the Japanese government to apologize for its past treatment of Korean women as sex slaves during the Asia Pacific War. Mrs. E is elderly, as are her friends. Many of the so-called "comfort women" have passed away. Mrs. E hopes that justice will be done before she meets her grave. She is surrounded by a crowd of civilians who support her struggle. Over the loud speaker a statement is read, a song is sung, a prayer is given. The window blinds of the Japanese embassy are shut. Stone faced guards and secret police make sure there is no outright confrontation. This peaceful sit-in has continued for seventeen years.

In December 2009, religious leaders from around the world, gathered for the Second Conference on Article Nine and Peace in Asia. There were various Buddhist, Christian and Muslim denominations represented. There was great meaning when we gathered in Seoul, because we were all made aware of the realities of the Cold War which still divide the Korean peninsula. East Asia has not been able to move beyond the dualisms of the Cold War era. What we witnessed was a wall; a remnant from the Cold War. The wall is invisible, but no less as real as the wall being built in Israel.

Part of our program was to join the sit-in, and pray alongside these women who were victimized by war. We were all moved by the experience. I was reminded of the story of Jacob who wrestled all night with the angel of God. Jacob refused to let the angel go until he received a blessing. Mrs. E is one of those Jacobs of our time. I see in her a faith that refuses to let go, trusting that God is a God of love and blessing for all.

Let us pray for the tenacity of Mrs. E and others that their belief in the possibility of justice becomes our call for the enactment of justice.

"Growing Projects"— Week of Compassion Offerings at Work

Growing projects are a unique way of getting local churches involved in working for food security all over the world. Essentially, churches pool together money to support a growing project, which can look like many things--some extra acreage managed by a local farmer, a community garden, a pumpkin patch that brings together the labor of a youth group and local retirees. The yield from that growing project-whether it is a share of what several head of cattle bring when sold at the stockyards, or the money that comes from fresh vegetables sold at a farmer's market--then goes to support one of the many food security projects all over the world; these projects help people utilize their skills in new ways, creating opportunities for sustainable small-scale food production.

Local growing projects take a good bit of work and coordination, but they are an amazing way to get churches--particularly rural churches-involved in making a big difference in fighting hunger all over the world. They can be joint ventures by small Disciples churches, a rural church with access to farmland can team up with a suburban or urban church with some financial resources to give, or it could emerge out of a local ecumenical effort--churches gathered together in a single community who want to do something to reach outside their town.

There are currently 12 growing projects sponsored by Disciples churches [in places such as Bosnia & Herzegovina, the Dominican Republic, Nicaragua, and Serbia], and they are supporting tremendous work overseas. Week of Compassion has some special grant money set aside to help foster more growing projects, and we'd love to see more take off, whether it takes the form of a longstanding family farm's labor of love or a local congregation's experiment in urban agriculture or community gardening.

Love for one's neighbor takes many forms, after all.
